FOOD GARDENS PROJECT STARTED IN SOWETO AND LEHAE

Roots & Shoots South Africa, KDR Sports and Adventure Travel (Pty) Ltd have joined forces to establish two new groups in and around Soweto. One is in the Kliptown squatter camp, a very poor area with few if any services and amenities. This group, made up of young individuals, established their club in a facility owned by Catholic nuns, who are no longer active in the area. There are both meeting rooms and a crèche on the premises.

The second group is in Lehae, south of Johannesburg, where a large number of people were relocated from informal (shack) settlements in and around Soweto into new Reconstruction and Development Programme (RDP) houses provided by the government. Although the residents now have formal houses with services, few other facilities have been provided in the area.

The establishment of these groups has given many unemployed youngsters a release for their energy. KDR sports, as part of its social development programme has been working with these groups for some time and with *Roots & Shoots*, to plan new initiatives compatible with the objectives of the two organisations.

The first project planned was food gardens and on 7th August 2007, a workshop was held in Kliptown presented by Luke Mdluli of Mpumalanga. The workshop exposed delegates to concepts such as organic gardening, propagation of seeds, planting and care of seedlings, preparing compost and nutrition. Basic tools, compost, seeds and seedlings were either donated or bought using allocated funds and were distributed to the two groups.

In Kliptown suitable land was available within the group's complex and planting commenced almost immediately. In Lehae however, suitable common land is still being sought and for the moment a patch within the residential property of one of the members is being used. It is hoped that the concept of food gardens will spread in the community. Within the Kliptown community particularly, this presents a unique challenge in that the land available to a household is generally minimal and not workable.

To overcome this, the idea of using old motor car tyres and drums is being pursued. Motor car tyres have a symbolic importance as often they have been used to set on fire to draw attention to grievances and in incidents of violence. Using tyres in creating a means of self sustenance may be used to change the preconditioned association into a symbol of hope and upliftment.

Ongoing support for Kliptown and Lahae food garden initiatives are needed and many channels are available for people to become involved. Already KDR has bought and presented netball poles and balls, and soccer balls to the young people. Other projects in keeping with the objectives may include trips to Suikerbosrand Nature Reserve, care for domestic animals and disabled people in the community.

Unfortunately the refuge is operating on the goodwill of the community Chiefs who now hold custodianship of this reclaimed land, but who have now signed over this particular piece of land to the local provincial council for the development of a R60million (\$8 million) soccer stadium presently being constructed for the 2010 Soccer World Cup that will take place in South Africa. We hope to continue to highlight their plight in order that they have a voice in the face of possible eviction.

Despite the ongoing challenges of this impoverished area, our projects for 2008 include hosting a teacher's workshop, aimed at encouraging all the schools that we support to establish individual *Roots & Shots Clubs*, in order to make improvements to their own schools, and the continued improvement of our school's current food gardens. We hope to be able to twin these previously disadvantaged schools with more affluent schools in the province for further assistance in their projects.
